We can use a five finger strategy to summarise non-fiction texts

TOPIC

(What/who is the topic of the text?)

MAIN IDEA

(What is the paragraph or text mainly about?)

KEY DETAILS

(What are the important facts that give more information about the main idea?)

Retelling the main events of a story in a shorter version.

SOMEBODY

(Who is the main character?)

wanted

(What did they want?)

BUT

(What was the problem?)

so

(How did they try to solve the problem?)

THEN

(How did it end?)
